

LTC Hans V. Becker Jr, a graduate of class 19-52, is inducted for his distinguished service. He began his career in Korea assigned to the 981st Field Artillery Battalion as an Air Observer. As a First Lieutenant, he served as a Battery Commander at Fort Carson, Colorado. He was then assigned to MAAG, Republic of China, then volunteered for service in Vietnam and assigned to the G1 section of the United States Capital Military Assistance Command (CMAC). He culminated his career as the Director of Industrial Operations at Fort Carson.

His military awards and decorations include: Legion of Merit with OLC, Bronze Star Medal, Air Medal, Joint Service Commendation Medal, Army Commendation Medal with 3 OLC, Good Conduct Medal, National Defense Service Medal with OLC, Korean Service Medal with 2 Bronze Service Stars, UN Korean Service Medal, Korean War Medal, ROK Presidential Unit Citation, Vietnam Service Medal with 6 Bronze Service Stars, Vietnam Campaign Medal with "60" Device, Vietnam Armed Forces Honor Medal First Class, Aircraft Crewman Badge, and the Parachutist Badge.

I. The following resume depicts only the highlights of this truly remarkable and unique officer's career. It is unfortunate that his service was curtailed so quickly for medical reasons. As indicated by the information presented below, his superiors envisioned that he would attain flag rank and recommended that he be promoted to that status on numerous occasions. His subordinates respected him and worked diligently for him because they knew he was always cognizant of their needs and demanded that their welfare be a paramount consideration in all circumstances. Their respect and dedication is reflected by the presentation they made to him when he retired. (See paragraph 3.)

1. Active Duty Service:

1953 – Assigned to the 981st FA Bn in Korea, Lt Becker volunteered for duty as an Air Observer. The normal tour of duty for Air Observers was three months. However, at the behest of his commanding officer, LTC David M. Kyle, Becker volunteered to remain with the Aviation Company to assist in training new observers and was placed on TDY for an indefinite period. He extended his Korean tour and remained with the Aviation Company for approximately 12 months. His service with the Company earned him the Bronze Star, the Air Medal, the Army Commendation Medal, and permanent award of the Aircraft Crewman Badge.

1954 – Assigned to the 8th Infantry Division at Fort Carson Colorado. Among various duty assignments Becker served as the Commanding Officer of a 105 MM Howitzer Battery when he was a first lieutenant. His performance of duty was again exceptional (Enclosure 1). The Division later moved to Germany. Becker attended the 8th Division Parachute School established in Augsburg, Germany and was qualified with the first class to graduate from the school in December 1958.

1957 – Commissioned in the Regular Army.

1959 – 1961 -Attended the Artillery Officers Advanced Course at Fort Sill and Completed a BGE Degree at the University of Omaha (now the University of Nebraska at Omaha) on Bootstrap program.

1962 – After a brief tour at Hq 5th Region ARADCOM, Becker was selected to be the Aide de Camp to MG Phillip H. Draper, Deputy Commanding General, ARADCOM. He subsequently served as the Assistant SGS for that headquarters.

1965 – Completed ICAF Economics of National Security Course.

1966 – Graduated from the Command and General Staff College.

1966 – Assigned to MAAG, Republic of China.

1967 – After completing approximately 18 months of a three year tour, Becker volunteered for assignment to Vietnam. His service in the ROC earned him the Joint Services Commendation Medal and several awards and commendations from the Chinese government.

1968 – Becker arrived in Vietnam during the Tet offensive. He was assigned to J1, MACV. In June of 1968 he volunteered for assignment as the G1 of The United States Capital Military Assistance Command (CMAC). This unit was being established with the mission of stopping rocket attacks on Saigon. Recognizing Becker's unique talents, the CG, CMAC, Major General J. H. Hay, assigned him the additional task of compiling a permanent Table of Distribution, which is normally a G-3 function (Enclosure 2). This TD was approved by the Department of the Army in the shortest period of time ever recorded up to that date. (It is unknown if this record still stands). After completing the tasks of writing the TD and finding the officers and enlisted personnel to man the unit, Becker voluntarily extended his Vietnam tour for six months in order to take the assignment as Advisor to the II Corps Artillery Commander in Pleiku. His duties there required him to accompany and advise his Vietnamese counterpart in places that included fire bases throughout the combat zone such as Dakto and Benhet. For his efforts in Vietnam he was awarded the Legion of Merit by the United States and the Honor Medal First Class by a grateful Vietnamese government. (Enclosure 3)

1972 – Not long after his assignment to Fort Carson, Colorado where he was the Director of Industrial Operations, it was discovered that Becker had cancer. A few months prior to his scheduled promotion to O-6 he was placed on the TDRL at 100% disability. His performance of duty was exemplary and prompted a special efficiency report (Enclosure 4) when he retired. This report stated (in part), "LTC Becker has accomplished miracles in a brief period. --- He is general officer material and should be recalled to Active Duty as soon as his health permits." He was also awarded his second Legion of Merit for this brief period of service.

2. Past – Present time:

Since retirement Becker has continued to exhibit qualities of leadership and service to the community that make him a prime candidate for the Field Artillery OCS Hall of Fame.

He is a life member of:
The Retired Officers Association
The United States Field Artillery Association
The Disabled American Veterans
The Veterans of Foreign Wars

He recently completed nine years as a member of the Board of Directors for Sportsmen's Paradise, Inc., a nonprofit corporation that represents mountain lake and river property owners dedicated to the use, preservation, and propagation of fish habitat in the Colorado Rocky Mountains. He served as treasurer, secretary, and president of this group. He also procured water rights (an extremely difficult and costly procedure) for seven fishing ponds and wrote a Policy and Procedures Manual for this Corporation. He has served as Vice President on the Board of Directors for Mount Calvary Lutheran Church in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

Not long after his retirement he became the single parent, caregiver, and provider for his two sons. He maintains that he did a good job because neither of them, at least at the present time, is behind bars and both seem to have survived his culinary efforts.

Even before his army service, this outstanding man was involved in activities and received honors that foretold his future eminence.

As a teenager he was selected for membership in the Order of DeMolay. He attained the highest rank in that organization as Master Councilor and was later awarded the honor of The Degree of Chevalier, which is one of the two highest honors conferred by the DeMolay Grand Council.

He was awarded a music scholarship to the University of Miami (Florida) where he became a member of Pi Kappa Alpha fraternity.

He is also a member of the honorary fraternity Rho Epsilon (inducted into this organization while attending the U of Omaha in 1961).

He generously supports organizations such as the Martin Luther Home, the DAV, the ARC, the Navigators, the Arthritis Foundation, the Alzheimer's Foundation, and many others by donating money and goods when and where they are needed. He has also donated his time and effort to the Meals on Wheels Program for incapacitated people.

On the lighter side and for his own personal way to monitor his physical status while still dealing with the possibility of a recurring cancer threat, Becker

qualified as an open water SCUBA diver when he was 60 years old and made what his wife hopes is his last parachute jump when he was approaching his 67th birthday.


3. Becker's outlook, dedication to service, determination, and general zest for life can probably best be summed up by the memento that was presented to him by the officers, enlisted personnel, and civilians that served under his supervision in his last assignment at Fort Carson. They gave him a pair of brass orbs mounted on a plastic slab. The inscription thereon reads, "LTC HANS V. BECKER, JR. *A Little Man With A Big "Pair"*".

Becker says that he treasures this "trophy" more than any other award he has received because, to him, it indicates that he did his job and the people that he was responsible for recognized that and appreciated his efforts on their behalf.

II. In addition to the many awards and decorations he has earned, his file is replete with letters of commendation and appreciation. One of these, from General Dwight E. Beach, CINC, US Army Pacific at that time, is enclosed as an example of the type of regard he elicited from many senior officers (Enclosure 5).

III. This intrepid warrior, statesman, philanthropist, and dedicated servant to his country is well suited for, deserving of, and meets all of the qualifications required for induction into THE FIELD ARTILLERY OCS HALL OF FAME.

IV. In due consideration of the foregoing, and realizing it is not as complete as it should be regarding his contributions and outstanding performance and dedication to his profession, his nation, and community, I unhesitatingly recommend and endorse LTC Hans V. Becker, Jr., USA, Retired, for induction into THE FIELD ARTILLERY OCS HALL OF FAME. If additional endorsements and recommendations are desired or required, please contact me.


This outstanding officer showed he is a experienced specialist in many ways.

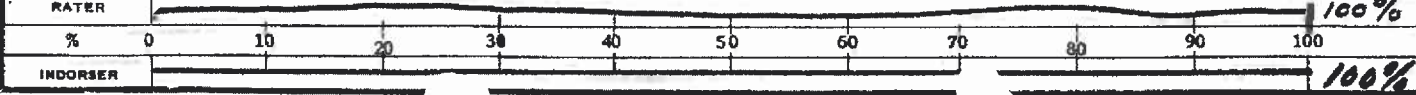

He has been an active and outstanding supporter of the Army's Equal Opportunity Program.

a. INDORSER I AM UNABLE TO EVALUATE THIS OFFICER FOR THE FOLLOWING REASON: Concur with the Rater's appraisal; LTC Becker, though faced with serious personal problems, has done a magnificent job during this period, a tribute to his professional ability and his moral and physical courage. I cannot state too strongly how badly I feel that he is leaving active duty and what a great loss it is to the service. He has been a strong supporter of the Army's Equal Opportunity Program.


