To a Cav Scout Pilot that Knew No Fear



I flew as an observer many times with Lt. Frank Walter Bengtson in his OH-6A while serving with A Troop, 1st Squadron, 9th Cavalry. It was an honor to have been his friend. We flew "hunter-killer" teams out of Tay Ninh to the north and west along the Cambodian border, and west into Cambodia to the Chup Rubber Plantation NW of Phum Suong. It was at the Chup Rubber Plantation that this great air cavalry pilot was shot down on May 7, 1971. He typically flew armed reconnaissance missions low and slow.

Lt. Bengtson was a great Scout pilot who loved to fly the OH-6A. He taught me much about the scouts during the time we flew together in A Troop, 1st of 9th Air Cavalry. He had tremendous wit, a great sense of humor and knew no fear. He was definitely a lover, a fighter and a wild horse rider! His memory and the memory of so many other fine cavalrymen that gave so very much will never fade.

I wanted to stop by before Memorial Day to remember an old friend from Apache Troop, 1/9th and pay tribute to this young hero.

He was a great scout pilot. I served as his observer/air crewman on his OH-6 helicopter with A Troop, 1/9th Air Cavalry. We flew pink teams out of Tay Ninh to the north and east along the Cambodian border, and west into Cambodia to the Chup Rubber Plantation and the Mekong River. I always enjoyed spending time with Lt. Frank Walter Bengtson, either on the ground in Tay Ninh or anywhere in the air.

On May 7, 1971, he was shot down in Cambodia near the Chup Rubber Plantation. I am sure that he has been missed by a great number of his friends. I will think of him and the many other Cavalry warriors who made that ultimate sacrifice with thanks for their service.

In the future, we will all meet again at Fiddler's Green. Fiddler's Green is the happy land imagined by cavalryman where there is perpetual mirth, a fiddle that never stops playing and dancers who never tire.

It was featured in old English legend:

When he comes to a pretty little village deep in the country and the people ask him what he is carrying ... he will know that he's found Fiddler's Green. The people give him a seat in the sun outside the Village Inn with a glass of grog that refills itself every time he drains the last drop and a pipe forever smoking with fragrant tobacco. From then onwards he has nothing to do but enjoy his glass and pipe and watch the maidens dancing to the music of a fiddle on Fiddler's Green.

It is also described in a ballad written anonymously for the US Cavalry and published in a 1923 US Cavalry Manual. It is still used in modern cavalry units to memorialize the deceased:

"In a shady meadow green,
Are the souls of all dead troopers camped
Near a good old-time canteen
And this eternal resting place
Is known as Fiddler's Green."

Rest well in the Mighty Hands of God, Frank Walter Bengtson, and know that you will never be forgotten.
