1LT Best was assigned to Battery A, 2nd Battalion, 4th Field Artillery and was serving as a Forward Observer with Company C, 5th Battalion, 60th Infantry, 9th Infantry Division (Mechanized) when he was mortally wounded on January 25, 1969, Kien Yuong Province, Plain of Reeds. He died of the wounds on January 29, 1969. He was posthumously awarded the Bronze Star Medal and the Silver Star Medal, which were presented to his parents in a ceremony at Fort Bragg in June of 1969.

You Are Not Forgotten

We were Artillery Forward Observers in the same battalion at Rach Kien. Butch was the B Co. F.O. and I was the F.O. in A Co. Lt Brick, the C Co. F.O. and I went up and visited him in the hospital before he died. I remember our shock and our sadness upon learning of his death. He seemed fine just a day or two before. We had a nice memorial service for him in the battalion. He was missed. We were all very young. It really hit home, losing one of the four of us F.O.'s. I have never forgotten him. We met for the first time in December of 1966 during our basic training at Fort Bragg. Reason:

For gallantry in action involving close combat against an armed hostile force in the Republic of Vietnam: First Lieutenant Best distinguished himself by exceptionally valorous actions on 25 January 1969 while serving as a Forward Observer with Company C, 5th Battalion, 60th Infantry, on a reconnaissance in force mission northwest of Tan An. After the lead elements of the company became pinned down by a murderous barrage of hostile fire, Lieutenant Best courageously moved forward with the command group to rescue the beleaguered men. When the company commander was mortally wounded, he immediately took command and repeatedly exposed himself to the fusillade as he maneuvered against the enemy emplacements. Upon reaching the forward element, Lieutenant Best began to administer first aid to a stricken soldier, but was then gravely wounded himself. He later succumbed to the wound received during his valiant actions. First Lieutenant Best's extraordinary heroism in close combat with an armed hostile force was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflects great credit upon himself, the 9th Infantry Division, and the United States Army.

Despite many adversities, he invariably performed his duties in a resolute and efficient manner. Energetically applying his sound judgement and extensive knowledge, he has contributed materially to the successful accomplishment of the United States' mission in the Republic of Vietnam. His loyalty, diligence and devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself and the United States Army.

Base Named In Honor of Lt. Hugh Best

A fire support base in Vietnam has been named in honor of the late Lt. Hugh E. Best, III.

In a letter to Mr. and Mrs. Hugh E. Best, Jr., Lt. Col. Floyd C. Adams, Jr., wrote:

On 8 August 1969, the 2nd Battalion, 4th Field Artillery, dedicated one of their Fire Support Bases - FIRE SUPPORT BASE BEST. The 3rd Brigade Commander, the battalion commander, the brigade chaplain, and all of the members of Battery A took part in the ceremony. The ceremony included the raising of a flag which had flown over the Capitol prior to being sent to the battery. During the ceremony, Col. Crittenberger, the brigade commander, said that "Lt. Best was the epitome of America - young, courageous, vigorous and always willing to help the oppressed." The officers and men were proud to dedicate their base to such a fine individual.
