

CPT Blanscet served with Battery E, 82nd Artillery (Aviation), 1st Cavalry Division as an OH-6A Helicopter Pilot. On 17 May 1970 he was flying a Scout mission as the "Low Bird" on a "Hunter-Killer" Team. He was flying low level at about 100 to 150 feet above the trees and went into a right hand turn. The aircraft lost airspeed in the turn, started spinning to the right after completing a 180 degree turn and crashed into the trees. CPT Blanscet had sensed something wrong a few minutes before the incident. He had instructed the door gunner to remove the inspection panel the next time the aircraft landed to check the tail rotor drive-shaft. CPT Blanscet died twenty days later from injuries sustained in the crash.

## Accident Summary:

The aircraft was assigned a scout mission as the "low bird" on a hunter-killer team. The aircraft had been flying for about 45 minutes on this mission before the accident. Approximately 5 to 10 minutes before the accident the pilot told the right door gunner to pull the inspection panels and check the tail rotor drive shaft because he thought something was wrong. This was to be done the next time the aircraft landed. The pilot was flying low level about 100 to 150 feet above the trees when he went into a right hand turn. The aircraft lost airspeed in the turn and started spinning to the right after completing a 180 degree turn. The pilot kept the aircraft fairly level until he crashed into the trees.
