1LT Charles Milton Fitts was the first graduate of Fort Sill Field Artillery OCS to die in the Vietnam War. He had served his country for eight years at the time of his death. LT Fitts was a Rotary Wing Aviator and died while a passenger in a CH-21C (Shawnee) helicopter that crashed as a result of hostile fire. He was serving with the 93<sup>rd</sup> Transportation Company, 45<sup>th</sup> Aviation Group, Military Assistance Advisory Group Vietnam (MAAGV)

# Notes from the Virtual Wall

Captain Fitts was a career military man from San Angelo, Texas. He first entered the Army as an enlisted man after graduating from high school and taking college courses in San Angelo. He served six years as an enlisted man and applied for and was accepted for OCS in Field Artillery at Fort Sill, Oklahoma. He completed OCS and was commissioned a 2LT in April 1961. He immediately applied and was accepted for Rotary Flight Training. He completed training in 1962 and applied for a branch transfer to Transportation and was promoted to 1st Lieutenant.

He went to Vietnam as a helicopter pilot with the Military Assistance Advisory Group in October 1962. He died as a passenger on a CH-21C helicopter that went down under hostile conditions. He was the first casualty of San Angelo and the second Permian Basin area servicement to die in Vietnam.

1LT Fitts was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for a previous action. Building 312 at Fort Rucker, Alabama is named for LT Fitts.

Seven men died when a CH-21C helicopter (hull number 55-04220) belonging to the 57th Transportation Company went down. The three crewmen were from the 57th; four passengers were from the 93rd Transportation Company.

On 25 June 1963, the 93rd Transportation Company (Light Helicopter) was redesignated the 121st Aviation Company and later was redesignated as the 121st Assault Helicopter Company (121st AHC).

#### **BIOGRAPHY**

Charles Fitts was born in Roscoe, Texas, the son Marie Crabtree and Eugene Fitts. He attended Roscoe School, and graduated in 1948. After high school, he moved to San Angelo and lived with relatives and worked as a truck driver. He enlisted in the U.S. Army in 1954. He married Jeraldine Elizabeth Weddle of San Angelo and the marriage produced two children both born in San Angelo. He served as an enlisted man for six years. On his third re-enlistment he applied for Officer Candidate School and was accepted. He attended the Field Artillery OCS at Fort Sill, Oklahoma in 1960-61 and graduated as a 2nd Lieutenant on April 1961.

Lieutenant Fitts applied for Rotary Flight Training upon completion of OCS and was trained at Fort Rucker, Alabama. He completed flight school in 1962. He was promoted to 1st Lieutenant and did a branch transfer from Artillery to Transportation. He departed

for Vietnam as a part of the Military Assistance Advisory Group-Vietnam in October 1962. He was a helicopter pilot for the 93rd Transportation Group, 45th Aviation Group. On January 11, 1963, he was one of three passengers and a crew of four on a CH-21C tail number 55-04220. The aircraft was from the 57th Transportation Company. The aircraft was flying in the area about 55 miles southwest of Saigon. The helicopter went down under hostile conditions and crashed on an island in the Mekong River. All seven personnel perished.

Lieutenant Charles Milton Fitts was buried in the Fairmont Cemetery in San Angelo, Texas with full military honors. Building 312 at Fort Rucker, Alabama was named and dedicated in honor of 1Lt. Charles Milton Fitts. He was survived by his wife, Jeraldine and his two children, Milton Eugene Jr and Sherri Marie all of San Angelo. He was also survived by his father of Carlsbad, New Mexico, his grandmother Mrs. Mollie Fitts of Roscoe and by two brothers and two sisters.

Fitts (as we called him) and Don Toth, were going to Saigon for the weekend. I was standing nearby as he talked to a pilot from the 56th Co., which had stopped at Soc Trang, for fuel and food. I overheard the pilot (a friend of Fitts) say, "put your things, in 611 and ride with me." The next morning on going outside, I found there was a search getting underway, for a H-21, which did not reach Saigon. It turned out to be 611. A small control rod had broken, causing a total loss of control, the crash and loss of all on board.
