A Note from The Virtual Wall

Lieutenants Terry D. Graham and Earl F. Browne of Advisory Team 47 died in the fighting at Duc Vinh on 28 March 1969.

In Memory of Terry

I led a small team that was attached to a brigade of the 1st Air Calvary Division that occupied the area at the time. When not deployed on specific missions with the Cav, we were seconded to MACV Team 47 and assisted where we best could. I met Terry and his teammate Lt. Earl Browne (Brownie) early in 1969. They were leading a Military Advisory Team (MAT team) and training a South Vietnamese Popular Forces (PF) unit in a small village just south of the Binh Long provincial capital of An Loc. We spent a number nights with Terry's and Brownie's team over the course of several weeks. They were a close group and fun to be with. The village to which they were assigned was located in the middle of rubber plantation country and was a very idyllic setting. On one of those nights we received an enemy probe and some direct and indirect fire. Villagers instantly disappeared into the relative safety of their homes and underground shelters. However, it wasn't anything unusual. The PF soldiers under Terry's and Brownie's leadership responded, and it was over as quickly as it began. However, several weeks later, there was a full-scale attack on that little village. I had been redeployed to another operation during that that period. When I returned, I found out that the team had been overrun, and there was apparently only one survivor, a non commissioned officer who managed to crawl away and bury himself out of sight. I understand that he was also badly wounded, but I believe he survived. Terry, Brownie and the interpreter didn't. Their bodies were recovered the next morning, when a relief unit from An Loc could finally make its way down to the village and secure it. Vietnam is always remembered as a war of battles involving the big American military units. However, much of it involved acts of uncommon bravery like that of Terry and Lt. Browne, working as advisors in very small isolated places, training young Vietnamese soldiers to defend their own villages and trusting and depending upon them to fight together to protect each other in the event of an attack. They were two very dedicated advisors, and I will always remember them and have always had the greatest respect and admiration for their dedication and their courage.
