Extract from 771st Tank Destroyer Battalion After Action Report: 5 Nov – 30 Nov 1944

On 21 Nov 1944 Company A was given the mission of supporting the attack of the 405th RCT on the high ground to the north and east of JMMENDORF. H-hour was set for 1030A. At 1000A the 3d platoon, under command of 1st Lt John Horton, left the assembly area in GEREONSWEILER and occupied firing positions in the locality of K925639 at 1030A.

Within a short time after taking up these positions, small arms fire w/tracer came from vicinity BEECK and LINDERN. Apparently these were ranging shots, for immediately following SA fire 88mm guns opened fire from high ground between BEECK and LINDERN and from southeastern edge of BEECK. Weapons could not be clearly observed, but appeared to be dug-in PERN VIS or 88mm guns (AA-AT). First round from enemy gun was a direct hit on destroyer of platoon commander, killing platoon leader and two enlisted men, by name, Lt. Horton, t-5 Decicco, and Pvt. Jebavay. bgt. Hedrick assumed command of the balance of the platoon and delivered fire against the enemy gun positions, constantly moving in the vicinity of the original positions. A hit by enemy fire was sustained on turret of TD commanded by Sgt. Osipovich and turret traverse was ja med. Platoon continued fire against enemy guns until they ceased fire. Droke was observed ricing from enemy positions but visibility was too poor to be certain of results of TD fire. Entire action lasted approximately fifteen of firing positions and continued to watch for suitable tagets, but none appeared
