CPT Jilcott served with the 240th Assault Helicopter Company, 1st Aviation Brigade. He died when the UH-1C Helicopter Gunship that he was piloting was shot down.

## From the James Warr Memorial Site

On March 8, 1968, a UH-1C Mad Dog Gunship, tail number 66-00705, was shot down on a mission which immediately killed the pilots, WO1 Guy L. Eisenhart and Captain Charles B. Jilcott.

On board the other Mad Dog Gunship which made up the fire team was Paul 'Frenchy' LaChance, the crew chief, who jumped out when the AC landed and ran to the burning, crashed Mad Dog Gunship and pulled the crew chief, SP5 James M. Warr from the burning wreckage. Sadly, three days later, SP5 Warr died from his injuries and burns on March 11, 1968.

# A Note from The Virtual Wall

The US Naval Forces Vietnam History for March 1968 describes Operation CORONADO XII, a sweep east of My Tho aimed at locating and destroying the 261st VC Main Force Battalion. Two infantry battalions were deployed on 07 March and contact was made the following day by 4th Bn, 47th Infantry about 5 miles northeast of My Tho. As stated by Mr. Labastida above, the fighting continued until about 3 AM on 09 March. At about that time, FSB HALLORAN just south of the engagement area was brought under attack by mortar fire. The sweep continued through 09 March with the infantrymen withdrawn in the late afternoon.

Forty-four VC dead were left on the battlefield and several small munitions and supply caches were found. Twelve US soldiers were killed in CORONADO XII, one was missing in action, and one sailor was killed in the mortar attack on FSB HALLORAN.
