1LT Jordahl served in Vietnam, as a Forward Observer with 1st Battalion, 5th Artillery and as a Liaison Officer for U. S. Infantry units and South Vietnamese Marines. After leaving active duty, he joined the United States Marshals Service and its Special Operations Group (SOG) and served on Fugitive Investigations Teams and the Witness Protection Program.

His supervisory assignments with the Marshals Service involved Watergate, Outlaw Motorcycle Gangs, and Organized Crime. He led the SOG operation that moved over 2,000 Vietnamese Repatriates to Guam, with U. S. Military support. He developed the Marshals Service Protective Services Unit and taught Protective Services to the Army after the 1979 assassination attempt on General Alexander Haig in Belgium. He directed the protective detail for Presidential Assailant John Hinckley, Jr, worked with the State Department at the United Nations and later commanded units protecting high threat Foreign Ministers.

Mr. Jordahl later served as Assistant Director for Law Enforcement and Investigations, U. S. Forest Service. As the Forest Service National Drug Control Coordinator, he managed cannabis and meth lab operations with military support, and interdiction teams on the Southwest Border, supported by the Military's Joint Task Force Six (JTF6).

At the Forest Service he also served as Assistant Director for Training, Development and Standards and Assistant Director for Operations and Policy. His decorations include the Bronze Star Medal with "V" with 2nd Oak-Leaf Cluster and the Purple Heart.
