Colonel Gordon R. Myers (Class 112-44)

Colonel Myers enlisted in the Army on September 2, 1942 and graduated from the Field Artillery Officer Candidate School at Fort Sill, Oklahoma on June 17, 1944.

During World War II he served in the European Theater and the Occupation Forces in Germany with the 22nd Constabulary Squadron through 1947. He was an ROTC Instructor at Kansas State University from 1948-1951 and then served with the X Corps Artillery in Korea 1952-1953. He was Assistant Plans and Training Officer for the 40th Field Artillery Group at Camp Carson, Colorado until attending the Command and General Staff College. Upon graduation from the CGSC in 1955, he was assigned to the Plans and Training Section at Continental Army Command Headquarters until 1958.

After graduating from the Armed Forced Staff College in 1962, he served with the 780th Field Artillery Battalion in Korea during 1962 and 1963. He graduated from the Army War College in 1965 and later served on the Staff of the Naval War College. He was serving as Army Advisor to the School of Command and Staff at the Naval War College, when he died in an automobile accident on the day he was scheduled to be promoted to Colonel.




