

BREWSTER MILTON ROBERTSON

After graduating from Officer Candidate School he attended the Medical Service Corps Basic Officers Course at Fort Sam Houston. He then served at Camp Picket, Virginia, as a Platoon Leader and Exec in Company B, 6th Medical Training Battalion until June, 1953 when he received orders for Korea. There he was assigned as Adjutant to the 121st Evacuation Hospital. After the truce was signed and following the completion of Operation Big Switch, he was rotated home in late November with an early release from active duty.

Following his military service, Mr. Robertson went to work in the pharmaceutical industry. In 1981, he was invited to the White House to consult with Nancy Reagan's fledgling efforts to combat drug use among school-age children. In the late 1980s, he transferred his copywriting skills and considerable medical marketing experience to the specialized area of public relations for private hospitals. Mr. Robertson retired from the field of medical marketing in 1992 and immediately began his current career as a novelist, writer and literary critic. He regularly writes about the arts, authors and contemporary literature for Publisher's Weekly and other widely-read periodicals. He is author of three novels: Rainy Days and Sundays (2000), The Grail Mystigue (2003), and A Posturing of Fools (2004). His novels always have a character who attended Officer Candidate School at Fort Sill and his portrayal of the school is always in the most positive light. Scores of thousands who would never have heard of Fort Sill or OCS have learned how important that experience was to the lives of those who trained there

In his varied endeavors, Brewster Milton Robertson has also been a commercial artist, teacher, photographer's model, film actor, ghost writer and consulting editor and a public relations beacon for Field Artillery Officer Candidate School.
