Tom was my classmate in Field Artillery Officer Candidate School at Fort Sill. We spent a lot of time together and were best of friends. I have a lot of pictures from our time there and whenever I look at them it brings back the memories. After we graduated on May 27, 1969 we went our separate ways.

Tom arrived in Vietnam on September 28, 1969 and served with the 101st Airborne Division. I spent some time at Fort Bragg and arrived in Vietnam on November 11, 1969.

His death hit me very hard and I think about him often. He was the only graduate of Class 10-69 to make the ultimate sacrifice in Vietnam and I will always remember him.

314 graduates of Field Artillery OCS were lost during the Vietnam War. I have researched all of them and have posted a Remembrance for each of them on the Virtual Wall of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund. CHRONOLOGY OF THE CURRAHEE COMMITMENT IN THE VIETNAM WAR 1970

(Revised 08/04/02)

April 8 Enemy Ambush Bravo Company. 2nd Platoon, Bravo Company was ambushed with command detonated mine. Platoon leader, 2Lt. Thomas Allen Scarboro, 22, from Asheville, NC was killed and six other Currahees wounded. The attached Scout Dog was also killed. 1st Platoon, Bravo Company was mortared with 15 rounds of enemy 82mm mortar fire. SP4 Richard Torres Calderon, 20, from Silverbell, AZ was killed and three others are wounded.

WAR

In the early morning mist, when all the stars are gone, A lonely man sits waiting, watching for the dawn.

His eyes are filled with sorrow, his heart is filled with pain, His mind is filled with anguish for the things he cannot change.
