Colonel Starr was born on January 12, 1930. He enlisted in the Army on September 3, 1948 and was commissioned a Second Lieutenant upon graduation from the Artillery Officer Candidate School, Fort Sill, Oklahoma on October 23, 1951.

He served in the Korean War and in Vietnam. He commanded an Anti-Aircraft Artillery Battery in 1954, served as an Advisor in Vietnam in 1965 and in 1975 commanded a Basic Combat Training Battalion at Fort Bliss, Texas. He later served as Director of Personnel and Community Services and culminated his career as the Chief of Staff, U. S. Army Air Defense Center, Fort Bliss.

He was the National Armed Services YMCA Military Volunteer of the Year in 1979.

His awards and decorations include the Legion of Merit, The Bronze Star, the Air Medal, the Army Commendation Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters and the Combat Infantryman Badge.

Col. Starr has been an active participant on El Paso Armed Services YMCA Committee of Management since 1975. As brigade commander of the newly formed Basic Combat Training Brigade at Fort Bliss, Col.
